It's Public Presentation Season!

What are Public Presentations?

What is the 4-H Public Presentation Program?

The purpose of the 4-H Public Presentation Program is to help youth speak confidently in front of others. Through the process of preparing and delivering a presentation, youth develop skills needed to choose a topic, research their presentation topic, organize ideas in logical order, develop visual aids, and deliver information in interesting and creative ways to impact their audience. With each public presentation, there is an increase in communication skills, self-confidence, poise, and knowledge. 4-H Public Presentations teach life skills that will be useful in young peoples' future educational, social, and career pursuits.

As youth progress and grow each year, they are challenged to try one of the more difficult types of presentations, to use more advanced technology in their presentations where appropriate, and/or to venture into unfamiliar topics or presentation styles.

Participants can choose from the following types of presentations:

- *Demonstration:* This type of presentation requires you to talk while working on something. It can be cooking, sewing, building, etc.
- Illustrated Talk: This is slightly more formal, using a poster or technology to help you relay your message.
- Speech: For the more experience speaker, you do not use posters or technology to get your point across.
- Dramatization/Recitation: A fun, confidence building experience -- it is like acting only with no props.
- Job interview: For ages 15 and up, cover letter and resume required. Learn useful job interview skills.



What is peer evaluation?

• Peer evaluation is the opportunity for youth to observe and evaluate each other by giving presentations and providing feedback within their group.

How does it work?

- You will be in a room with three other 4-H members. All four 4-Hers (yourself included) will give their presentation to each other.
- You will complete a brief evaluation form for each presentation that you will share with your peers giving each other feedback.
- Two adult evaluators will also be in the room who will share verbal feedback and complete the regular rubric, then give you a point score to decide your ribbon color.
- This whole experience will take approximately two hours.
- There will be a required, brief pre-event virtual orientation to help you feel prepared.

Why participate?

- Get feedback directly from fellow 4-H peers, in addition to adult evaluators.
- Gain experience in evaluating and giving feedback.
- Get community service hours since you'll be benefiting other 4-H members through your feedback, participating in this format can count toward school service hours.

How do I sign up?

On the Public Presentation registration page to select **Peer Evaluation** for either Saturdays of 4-H Public Presentation Days (Feb 8th or 22nd). The 4-H Office will follow up with you to confirm the time block of your group.


Livestock Notes - December 2024

Youth Citizen Scientists Needed Hemlock Woolly Adelgid Surveying! Saturday, January 18, 9:30 am-12 pm Emery Park- 2084 Emery Road South Wales, NY 14139

Location to be shared after registration

The Eastern Hemlock (*Tsuga canadensis*) is an important tree species considered valuable to our local ecosystems. These trees provide stream habitat for trout species, create habitat for countless native plant and animal species, and their presence enhances outdoor recreation experiences. Unfortunately, these majestic trees are under attack from the Hemlock Woolly Adelgid (HWA), an invasive, aphid-like insect who attacks the tree by attaching itself at the base of a needle. HWA multiply quickly and when too many HWA attack a hemlock tree, the tree will die, usually in 4-7 years.

Engaged citizen scientists are important to detect HWA and help to slow the spread of this insect and preserve hemlock forests. The early detection of emerging infestations allows appropriate management actions to be taken. We need help from volunteers like you and your family!



We will start indoors to learn about hemlock trees, HWA, and invasive species reporting tools before heading outside to look for them in the park.


Erie County Crafters

The conference was really good, and I had a really good time. We did a lot of workshops with getting to know each other and how to find career paths and ways to take action as leaders. It was an amazing experience to hear from the state officials and FFA state leaders and get to hear their stories. I was also able to find a group of friends when I went in knowing nobody I was able to connect with Jack Beyer, who is an FFA state leader. I was able to talk with my principal once I got back. She is giving me the chance to talk to the entire school and bring in Jack as a guest speaker to talk about his story with agriculture. 4-H members whose essays are selected will then compete in four designated counties (Delaware, Monroe, Orange, and Staten Island. Awards, trophies, and cash prizes will be awarded.

If a 4-H member's essay places at the regional level, they will advance to a state-level competition in Albany, NY. Winners at the state level will advance to Washington D.C. to compete in the national competition.



Every year the Western New York Gladiolus Society sponsors the Glads for 4-Hers program. They provide 4-Hers with gladiolus blubs to plant and grow. Members learn how to plant and care for the Glads under the direction of Meredith and Sally Hudson.

The 2025 workshop will held East Aurora, *(tentatively scheduled for late April, 2025)*. BULBS will be handed out at that meeting. In return for the Society's sponsorship, 4-Hers are encouraged to exhibit their project at the Erie County Fair.

First year participants will be required to pay \$5.00 for their first package (25 bulbs).
